PRESIDENT'S REPORT

LOCAL ELECTIONS

As per the International Constitution, Local Union elections will be held in April 2003.

Nominations for President and Board members will take place according to the 2020 bylaws at the regular membership meeting in February.



In order to run for office, "the member shall have been in continuous good standing for a period of twenty-four months immediately preceding the month in which the election is held..." (Article VII, Section 9, A) and, "the members shall have attended at least one third of the regular meetings held by the member's local Union during the twenty four month period immediately preceding the month in which the election is to be held." (Article VII, Section 10)

Proposed times and locations for all Local 2020 polling stations will be presented for membership approval at the February meeting.

I have decided not to seek re-election in the up coming Local Union Election in April. At this time, I would like to take the oppor-

tunity to thank the 2020 executive and all members for their support over the last three and a half years. As President, I have had the chance to meet many people, see many different places, and my experience has been a memorable one that I will cherish forever.

I am very proud to have been a part of the forming of Local 2020. I feel it has been a great success and it will continue to grow and flourish. VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT



Contracting out is a well known term in all work places today. The way I define the term: people outside of the union doing our work. Falconbridge, where I am employed, refers

to this practice as “Outside Services”.

Tens of millions of dollars are spent in this area annually on outside services. For this reason, I refer to the practice as “a war on our rights”. All Union Stewards and Chief Stewards are on notice and grievances are being filed continually to counter this practice.

Other ways in which our work is being attacked is via staff employees doing bargaining unit work, temporary employees, and outsourcing. This issue has swelled so drastically in the past year that it now accounts for over 50% of all grievances. In fact, negotiations in one years time will have to focus on protecting and maintaining the integrity of the bargaining unit. I am tired of hearing that there is a hiring freeze when nickel prices are close to \$4.00/lbs. and Falconbridge is very profitable and is forecast to be so for the next five years.

I encourage all 2020 Units to police this issue at your workplace in order to send a strong message to management to back off and leave bargaining unit work to bargaining unit members.

The grievance procedure can be utilized up to and including third party determination to combat this, should contract language support our case. If we lack contract language, then it should be put as a priority to negotiate improvements.

In order for all units and Local 2020 members to have an equal say, I ask that you please take the time to vote in the upcoming Local 2020 elections. A failure to vote is a failure to voice your right to select representation.

Finally, I would like to thank all union activists for their ongoing work efforts and dedication to the cause. I certainly know your job isn’t easy, but without you we would be weakened and vulnerable.

NORTHEASTERN ONTARIO AREA COUNCIL

Just as locals meet on a monthly or bi-monthly basis to deal with the issues of the membership, District 6 is set up with a network of area councils that convene (generally quarterly) to discuss successes and challenges the locals within their boundaries are facing.

In Northeastern Ontario, each local is allowed two voting delegates at these meetings and up to five additional members who may provide input in all discussions but who do not vote. This voting structure was set up to ensure that the larger locals would not dominate motions.

In addition, information from the district is passed down to the delegates by the Area Coordinator (Dave Mellor), and the Area

Report from the September 12 Area Council Leadership Meeting:

Wayne Fraser reported that the Union has been experiencing difficulty collecting dues from some employers and requested that locals attempt to negotiate appropriate language where this is a problem.

Wayne also spoke about the International Convention and two issues that will impact on us ~ first the change in dues distribution, and second ~ the seat created on the executive for the Canadian National Director.

This second item was one that was talked about a lot during the Country wide tour of the Task Force on the state of the Canadian union. All were pleased to hear that this, and the communications piece (from which the Area Council Leadership team sprung) were implemented. It is gratifying to know that the Union is listening to the rank and file.

Brad James (Corporate strategist) reported on Strategic Campaigns. We are all aware of the Westray fight and the International Campaign mounted against Bridgestone.

While ultimately successful, both of these fights were launched after the fact and might have been more effective had we been more proactive. Brad outlined a plan to hit “bad actors” before a strike or lock out is in place by accessing information on their financial position, as well as corporate partners, community partners etc...

Brando Paris (Organizing) outlined the organizing drives within District 6 for 2002 to date including wins, losses, and active campaigns. Two of the losses, EXTRA Security, and Superstyle Furniture are being challenged at the Board. In the first instance, the board allowed the company to hold a vote at one location only forcing workers to travel some forty miles across Toronto. The Union’s challenge is that this placed undue hardship on many low wage supporters

In the second case, the employer brought two busloads of non-union supporters to the polling station, including supervisors from another plant who chanted “Union No” and other slogans while workers had to walk past them to cast their votes. The disturbing thing about these examples is that USWA seems to be the only union challenging the board’s decisions in similar cases.

The District has come out with a policy on long-term collective agreements. With the economy being as volatile as it is, we are being discouraged from negotiating anything over a three-year deal. What we agree to today in wages and benefits may not look so good five years down the road.

Marie Kelly (assistant director) reported on education in the district. In 2002, 5% of members in District 6 received Union training in one form or another. With membership sitting at slightly over 83,000, that adds up to over 4,000 members learning how to work better for you.

In District 6, 21 workplaces (1,485 members) were organized in 2002, including 3 who will come under the 2020 umbrella.

UNIT 6600 OTP (INCO)

Through the job posting process, we discovered that while we still had members on the 1998 recall list, an administrative assistant was hired in February

1999 in Mines Research. In meetings with the company, they agreed to fix the problem and this will result in payment of about \$140 000.00 to about 12 of our members who were recalled improperly, in addition, some of them will receive seniority for the period in question.

We have also just signed an interim letter of agreement on accommodated individuals (those who come into the unit from outside). The vacancy is of a higher pay grade than some of our current members now hold. Those members will be canvassed in order of seniority to fill that vacancy, provided they have the skills to do the job and the accommodated individual will fill the hole in the lower pay grade.

**MESSAGE FROM WAYNE
FRASER**



Greetings to all of the 2800 members in Local 2020.

My roots are here in Northeastern Ontario. And as Director, there is not a day that goes by that I do not use the many lessons I learned from members of our Union in Northern Ontario.

The United Steelworkers achieved a great deal in 2002. We bargained strong agreements in almost every sector of the economy. We helped over 1,800 people across Ontario and the Atlantic Provinces join our Union. We maintained our leadership role in the labour movement with our effective political action and lobbying.

In 2002, I was privileged to play a role in many sets of negotiations (such as Stelco in Hamilton, University of Toronto, Ivaco in Hawkesbury, University of Guelph) and I plan to do more of that in 2003. Collective bargaining is the cornerstone of our Union and I plan to keep my promise to work with our local unions and our staff to strengthen our bargaining muscle.

This year we will bargain more than 250 collective agreements covering at least 31,000 members of our Union. In addition to the important negotiations this spring at Inco in Sudbury and Port Colborne (and I plan to be in Inco bargaining this year, as usual), this list includes such large employers as the Ottawa Congress Centre, Brunswick Mining and Smelting in Bathurst, NB, National Steel Car in Hamilton, and Trenton Works in Trenton, NS. As well, thousands of Steelworkers who are security guards are seeking new contracts in 2003, as will hundreds of call centre employees at Telespectrum Worldwide Canada Inc., in St. Catharines and Omega Direct Response Inc. in Sudbury.

While each set of negotiations is unique, there are common goals that we will push hard at every bargaining table, such as decent pensions, wage increases, employment security and the health and safety of our members on the job.

By the time that you read this, a new leader of the federal New Democratic Party will have been chosen. I backed Jack Layton, but regardless of who wins I know that our Union will work hard to continue the momentum built up by the NDP in the last few months. Support for the party is up across Canada. And Steelworkers in Northeastern Ontario know very well the need for strong NDP representation in the federal and pro-

vincial legislatures. So let's also rededicate ourselves to building a strong and progressive NDP voice in the federal and provincial legislatures.

The union is currently involved in negotiations on many fronts. First agreement negotiations are presently underway at the Y.W.C.A., Geneva House, Sudbury

Neutrino Observatory (S.N.O.) and at Northern Logistics Trucking. In addition renewal negotiations are currently in motion with Mike Douglas Chrysler Inc., Municipalities of Markstay & Warren and with Journal Printing. The members at the Salvation Army Centre and Bridges by Brother T's have recently signed agreements. Local 2020's largest unit at OMEGA have recently elected its bargaining committee and preparations for negotiations are in the early stages. 2003 appears to be a busy year at the bargaining table with a further 18 other contracts up for renewal during the year. In addition, this is also the year that local 6500 and Inco get down to serious bargaining.
